What Is the Mission?

The Network's mission is to make sure that Autistic people and their families guide the decisions that shape autism policy in Canada.

What Is the Vision?

A Canada where the real-life experiences of Autistic people and their families shape:

- Policies
- Services
- Communities

So that Autistic people have:

- Inclusion
- Equity
- Opportunities
 At every age and stage of life

What Is a Strategic Priority Committee?

Strategic Priority Committees are small groups of people who help turn the big goals in Canada's Autism Strategy into real, workable solutions across the country.

The committees:

- Share knowledge
- Recommend helpful actions
- Support partnerships across systems (like health, education, or jobs)
- Help government understand what's needed for long-term change

What Do Committees Focus On?

There are five committees, each based on one of the five focus areas across the lifespan in Canada's Autism Strategy:

- 1. Screening, Diagnosis, and Services
- 2. Economic Inclusion
- 3. Data Collection, Public Health Surveillance, and Research
- 4. Public Awareness, Understanding, and Acceptance
- 5. Tools and Resources

Who Should Apply?

We are looking for people who have:

- Experience working in these areas
- Professional or research knowledge
- Real-life experience in one of the five focus areas

You might be:

An Autistic person with work or research experience

- · A family member who works in the system
- A clinician, educator, advocate, or subject expert
- A policymaker, data specialist, or strategist

What Do Committees Do?

Each committee looks at the goals in its area and helps answer:

"What will it take to make this happen across Canada in a fair, effective, and lasting way?"

The committees will:

- Review each action item in the strategy
- Identify what supports, tools, or partnerships are needed
- Suggest what should happen first, and what has the most impact
- Recommend who should lead each part, and how to track success
- Point out risks, gaps, or overlaps
- Offer improvements and new ideas

This work turns big ideas into practical, real actions that help Autistic people and their communities.

Time Commitment and Support

- Each committee will meet about 6 times per year.
- Total time is about 42 hours per year, including:
 - o Prep time
 - Meeting time
 - o Follow-up work

You will be supported by a Committee and Council Engagement Coordinator who will help with:

- Scheduling
- Background information
- Follow-up after meetings

How to Apply

You must be a member of the Network to apply. Membership is free. The membership and application form are combined into one.

You will be asked about:

- Your background
- Your experiences
- Which area you want to help with

You can ask a support person to help you with the form.
